Jean Ritchie recorded that when her dad sang this song for her for the first time, the entire school room erupted into excited dancing. This folk song is therefore traditionally accompanied with a lively step-dance (also known as clogging). Begin by stepping to the rhythm of the words. Every time you say a new word, step your feet. Can you clog and sing at the same time?

As you get more comfortable and advanced, choose a favorite section of the song and just clog that rhythm while someone else clogs another rhythm in the song. Listen to the rhythm of your feet!
